Lorna Briggs (nee Heavon)

Lorna, born 30th March 1960, youngest child of nine to Alice (nee Tarrant) and Charles Heavon sadly lost her long battle with cancer on 25th July 2023.

Lorna spent her early years in the family home in Nodmore where she found her lifelong friend Jane Fishlock. Lorna attended St Andrews primary school as did all her siblings, her mum and many generations before. There was always a member of the family at the school from when it opened to when it finally federated with Great Shefford and even since then there has been a family member at the federated schools, given a year or two break in tradition.

Lorna was christened at St Andrew's Church, and on the 14th of July 1984. She married Stephen just a short time after the passing of her loving father Charles, who was laid to rest at the churchyard. Her brother Donald took the place of Charles and proudly gave her away.

Although now married, Lorna was a regular to the village to visit family members and has

done so until her final months. In 2005 Lorna came together with all her family and friends to say a final farewell to her mum Alice, who finally got to join Charles again and was laid to rest with him.

She moved away to start her only family with Stephen, she was blessed with a son, Jason was born in 1987 and he was the apple of her eye. She enjoyed parenthood and it suited her. She then received the devastating news that she had cancer, and with all her family and friends around her, she fought this terrible disease.

Achieving so many things in her life, moving to her beloved Swanage, watching her son grow and get married to Tash, welcoming her grandson Zac into the family, moving back to be closer to family again, tending her beautiful garden, seeing her beloved *West Life* over and over again, and finally moving even closer to Jason, Tash, and Zac in the village of Kintbury.

Lorna was finally laid to rest at St Andrew's Church on 8th August 2023, close to the resting place of her mum and dad. Family and friends gathered to give her the send-off she deserved and they joined in the gathering place for all her family get-togethers, the infamous Village Hall, to celebrate her life, reminisce with photographs and memories, rocky road bake-off, (Lorna's is still the best) and a final toast of her favoured Perno and black.







The History Bit



This is the rather harrowing tale of a local suicide that took place in 1889 at Norris Lane. Until relatively recently Chaddleworth had a resident policeman first living in Upper End and latterly at number 15 Nodmore. In the late 19th century James Doss came to live in Chaddleworth. Before this move the census of June 1841 showed him living in Shadwell (east London) and in August of that year he married Amelia Sanders their 'witnesses were Named as Shadrach and Charlotte Moore.

James joined the Metropolitan police as a constable in October of that year and in 1847 was promoted to sergeant. An amazing adjunct was that in October 1849 the Home Secretary believed to be Sir George Grey of Dublin granted James Doss a gratuity of £24 in lieu of a pension 'as he had become worn out and unfit for further duty'. He was just 29 years of age.

He was then appointed to be Chief Constable of Saffron Walden on the 23rd of November 1849 (so not so 'worn out') at a salary of 25 shillings per week with an additional 3 shillings and sixpence for lodgings.

Unfortunately for James his behaviour let him down somewhat and after an assault charge being put to him he resigned. He 'bounced back' once again in 1856 in the newly formed Berkshire Constabulary as a First Class Constable. Prudently he did not mention his service in Saffron Walden.

In March 1856 he was posted to Hampstead Norris and in 1857 he was promoted to sergeant and transferred to Faringdon. Once again his behaviour lapsed and he was demoted to First Class Constable because of 'irregularity' and was moved to Marcham, Abingdon Division.

In June that year yet again he was in trouble, this time he was reduced to a 3rd Class Constable for drunkenness and fighting when on duty, but two years later 1863 he was promoted to 2rd Class Constable and again on the 5th of August 1867 he was promoted to 1st Class Constable, so quite a turbulent career!

In October 1870 he was granted one penny 'per diem' (per day) as good conduct pay! In May 1871 he was posted to Abingdon and August 1874 he was granted an additional 'penny per diem' (per day) good conduct pay. He was then in April 1875 promoted to Merit Class Constable (the highest grade) and in May was posted to Chaddleworth.

He lived in the Upper End 'Police House' (see photo) that is now lived in by Mick and Maggie Hedges. Mick found Jame's old Berkshire Police Badge in the garden (see photo). The photo of the Police House Upper End was taken in 1888 when Marion Holders (currently living in Normanstan Leckhampstead Thicket) Great Grand parents named Jehu and Agnes Thomas and their son Percy lived there. Jehu's profession was a Master Tailer and Prudential Insurance Agent.

Sadly in 1885 James Doss was found to be medically unfit for duty and he was recommended for a pension after serving for 29 years and 4 months in the Berkshire force and 8 years in the Metropolitan Police. His pension therefore was 18 shillings and 3 pence per week equating to two thirds of his pay.

On the 28th of May (4 years later) he committed suicide by throwing himself down the well in Norris Farm (verdict death by drowning). On

the 29th of May (the day after- so very speedy) an inquest was held at The Ibex Inn. The coroner was Llewellvn Jotcham (from Wantage) and the jurymen Rev George Herbert Rust, Newton Dance, James Bradley, John Thomas, Alfred Tarrant, Simon Sayer, Henry John Beale, Charles Spanswick, John Uzzell, Joseph Sproules, Henry Pearce, and James Fisher. The last three in this list were illiterate and so made their mark on the verdict document. There were 4 witnesses including Amelia Doss the widow of James. Some of the statements were harrowing as in order to retrieve the body a set of grapplers were sent to the Blacksmiths shop in Main Street to be sharpened so they might better grip the body. (This is where Martyn Lisby now lives).

Many attempts were made to haul the body up but it kept slipping off and eventually his coat was brought up without the body. At 2 o'clock in the afternoon 5 and half hours later the body was finally brought to the top of the well and there had been much mutilation to his thighs and legs. The local surgeon William James Wood of Brightwalton (spelt Brightwaltham in

the Newbury Weekly News of those days) gave evidence saying that he had known the deceased for many years and could not say he had noticed anything unusual in his behaviour of late as he was a regular attendee at the surgery due to his wife's 'affliction' which was incurable. He went onto say that James Doss seemed very anxious about his wife and wondered what would happen to him if she died first. It was clear that he relied on her for his mental health. After his burial in St Andrews. Church. Amelia Doss went to live with her daughter in Deptford and died of apoplexy (similar to a stroke). This was the affliction referred to by Dr Wood which was almost certain to be an inoperable brain tumour. She was returned to Chaddleworth and is buried in the churchvard with James Doss.

The grave is to the left of the giant beech tree heading from the gate and is clearly marked. It is thought by some that a suicide victim cannot be buried in consecrated ground but in this case it is obviously not true.

Sky Notes for September


The **autumnal equinox** occurs this year on 23rd September, marking the moment half way between mid-summer and mid-winter, when the length of our days and nights are approximately the same, 12 hours each. The Sun then rises and sets at about 6am and 6pm GMT, so 7am and 7pm British Summer Time. For early risers, **Venus** is now a brilliant sight, rising low in the east in the two hours before sunrise which is 6:15am at the start of the month, but as already mentioned, just after 7am by the end.



Making the news last month was that there was a "super blue moon" on 31st August. It is only in recent years that these terms have been in common use, it was "super" because by chance the moon was full very near to the point in its slightly elliptical orbit where it is closest to Earth and therefore looks larger than average. It was "blue" not because of any colour change but because there was the relatively rare occurrence of two full moons in the same calendar month, only about 3% of full moons are "blue", but this has no astronomical significance. However, about 25% of all full moons are attributed as "super". Indeed, four full moons in a row, from July to September this year will have been "super" moons, the last being the full moon on the night of 27th September. This is a comparison of the 12% change in apparent size of the moon when nearest and furthest from us.

The planet Jupiter is becoming easier to see in the late evenings and before midnight is in the south-east sky, the brightest object other than the moon until Venus rises in the early hours. Jupiter will be at its best at the beginning of November this year, but if you have binoculars or a telescope it is well worth taking a look before then. A telescope will reveal the main cloud bands on the planet's disk but even binoculars will easily reveal the four biggest moons, lo, Europa, Ganymede and Callisto. Here a chart adapted from one by the British Astronomical Association shows the changing positions of the four moons during September, matching the binocular view (an astronomical telescope inverts the view, west appearing on the left). Days read down the page in two columns and the disk of Jupiter is represented to scale as a pair of vertical lines. The track of the inner moon lo plotted in yellow can be seen to go from one side of Jupiter to the other much more rapidly than Callisto, plotted in blue, the outermost of the four moons. As an example, just before midnight on the night of the 16th (i.e. 17.0 on the chart) all four of the moons will be to the west of Jupiter. Peter Birtwhistle
